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Handbagged was a witty evocation for those of a certain age of the political turbulence of the 1980's. Strong performances from two Queens and two Maggies were underpinned by Mark Bailey and Stuart Marshall playing everyone else from Arthur Scargill and Dennis Thatcher to Kenneth Kaunda and Nancy Reagan. Some may say it was a pity that Prince Philip only got two lines (or maybe not).

The Evening of One Act Plays saw two very different plays. "The Turn of the Screw", by Henry James, adapted and directed by Stephen Goddard, was interesting and very thought provoking, raising more questions than it answered. A dark, chilling ghost story, reviewer Robert Gosling said "the acting was excellent, with a particularly strong performance by Stacey Waterworth as the Governess. It was particularly good to see that Youth Theatre Members were also involved in this production". By contrast, "Make Yourself at Home" by David Foxton and directed by Chris Ward, is set in the house of a roguish Parisian doctor and his philandering wife in 1912. Add two maids a lover and a window cleaner and there were infidelities and misunderstandings aplenty in line with the best traditions of a farce. "Again, the acting was excellent. The audience were well entertained by this piece which moved along with excellent timing and humour. The whole evening provided splendid entertainment for the sell out audience."

June Cashman, who has died in her mid eighties, was an exceptionally fine actress, performing with the Group when productions were staged at Earlsheaton School. She gave an outstanding and magical performance in "The

Glass Menagerie" and an equally impressive performance in the Group's award-winning staging of Feydeau's "The Birdwatcher". She also performed with the Dewsbury Collegians both in straight plays and in musicals. Her talent in costume design and making led to her working for Yorkshire Television while still contributing greatly to Group activities. While living in Knaresborough she always supported the Group's festival appearances at the Frazer Theatre and at the Harrogate Theatre.

Mary Dawson was a wonderful supporter of the Group. A patron and season ticker holder for many years she will be remembered by many when helping front of house for most productions. Her favourite seemed to be selling sweets. We shall all miss her welcoming smile and wicked sense of humour

Youth classes have focused on rehearsing the plays that they are to preform as part of the Youth Theatre Showcase on 15th and 16th May. Years 1&2 will perform *Goodnight Children Everywhere* by David Foxton whilst year 3 will give a premiere to a new play by Matt Bailey called *Freedom's Game*. Youth section members have been the backbone of the success of the Group over the years and have made significant contributions to other productions this season. Please support them as they strut their own stuff.
